



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Alvina's Hat Parlor and Millinery

Alvina Sellers grew up in Clarion, and left a legacy at Heartland Museum. In 1968 Alvina started her "new career" giving talks about hats. Self described as shy, Alvina's cheerful and informative talks got her past the shyness as she gave 5,636 presentations, with the final one being May 2003.

Alvina left over 300 hats at Heartland Museum, and the hat parlor and millinery shop on the Victorian Street were designed to showcase those hats. A favorite spot for our women visitors, we encourage people to (carefully) try on a hat or two and take pictures. And yes, a few gentlemen have also tried on a few! The hats range in age from late 1800's to 1960's time frame.

There are great stories about Alvina, including her visit on the David Letterman show. That show is on tape and can be viewed in the Hat Parlor. Alvina gave

talks filled with hat history and jokes. One of her tidbits that she shared with Letterman was that during the Civil War, women's hats were flat in back so the women could sleep in them. That way, the hats would not be stolen by incoming soldiers.

It appears that the young lady by the name of Miss L....had two lovers, one by the name of W.....and the other G...., and all signs indicated that Mr. W. had the consent of the young lady and her parents and was hauling the lumber for his house, for that happy day was to come when the twain was to be made one flesh. Mr. W had purchased her wedding garment and was counting the days as they passed by, but alas, there is many a slip between the cup and lip. While Mr. W thought his love was true, there could be no deception in the heart of his love. Alas, Mr. G appeared at the home of the young lady with a fine team and carriage and the lady let with Mr. G.

Fire - The house of Mr. Henry Fox, a mile south of town was discovered on fire. Joel Aldrich and George Kinson at once ran their teams to the place. Two small children, age four and six were alone in the house and saved. Everything in the house and the house itself was destroyed.

Births - Mr. and Mrs. Dow of township are extremely happy over a ten pound event that appeared at their house Saturday. It's a girl. Seaman died in Clarion aged 44 years and one month. She bore her lingering sickness with Christian Fortitude.
